A Young Reader on a Mission

"My son Nolan began participating in Mission: Read on day one. He had completed 1,000 Books Before Kindergarten (1KB4K) and was excited to get started on this program from the day it launched. He already loved books and reading, but this was something more. Mission: Read gave him a tangible, achievable goal. One thousand days seemed so far away in the beginning, but he was confident he would get there eventually!

One amazing thing I've noticed since Nolan began the program is his use of KDL's ebook and audiobook collection. He feels excited at the beginning of each month for the new comics he can download on hoopla. He goes to sleep each night listening to an audiobook he's borrowed on OverDrive. Sometimes I will go in to turn out the lights in his room and listen along. When I ask him in the morning, 'What were you listening to last night?' we have conversations about the funny books he finds in the catalog. He recently recommended a read-aloud for his class that he had listened to and thought others would enjoy. It makes me proud that he not only utilizes these resources, but is excited to share them with others.

Nolan's making huge strides and is almost finished with Mission: Read. However, I know his reading journey won't end when he completes the program in October. Books and reading are simply part of his daily life. I look forward to seeing his love of reading flourish as he grows, just as he looks forward to the Spider-Man comics he can borrow next month!"

Get Out & Grow!

Over the past year, both parents and children have spent more time on screens and sitting still than we probably want to admit. And maybe we're feeling pressured that the shutdowns and virtual schooling have left some of our kids far

behind typical grade-level benchmarks. Parents might even feel the need to continue to push screen time for learning-related activities as summer unfolds, to be sure kids stay on track with learning goals. There's no doubt those prepackaged learning modules give a sense of accomplishment and covering the necessary bases. It's also why STEAM camps, play groups and scripted activities are so popular in the summer — we're checking off learning and fun on our to-do list!

While we're still trying to maintain social distancing, how can we be sure of highlevel learning opportunities without the screen time, camps or play groups? How can we know what will best keep young minds going and growing this summer?

KDL offers a variety of activities to engage and educate your children this summer. Check out our Summer Wonder Activity booklet for great STEAM ideas. But don't stop there! Think of the acronym fresh A.I.R. – Active, Imaginative, Relaxed. There is no doubt that summer sunshine and free play do wonders for the mental health and stress levels of both parents and children, but many people are unaware of how science supports play as learning.

ACTIVE

Stay active! Early elementary students are still developing neurologically, and simple activities will help fine-tune their brains for reading and learning. Chasing bubbles, playing catch or kicking a ball all activate the spatial skills and eye development essential to being able to follow text on a page.

Playing hopscotch may seem like a simple activity, but alternating feet and repeating patterns stimulate a child to engage both hemispheres of the brain, which is essential in deciphering the meaning of text and connecting it to abstract concepts. The same thing happens when you do jumping jacks or dance moves that cross from left to right or vice versa.

Challenge your child to daily dance contests, spin around out in the sunshine and create games that encourage lots of body and eye movement. You are working the muscles and brain areas that help your child become a better learner!

IMAGINATIVE

Use your imagination! Learning doesn't always have to feel like learning. Think of the science and math concepts involved in following a recipe and have your child help prepare a meal. Allow them to experiment with new ingredients or choose a food they've never tried before for a family meal. Have them create recipe cards to share with family members for the experiments they liked best.

Lie outside and look at the clouds. See who can find the most interesting shapes. Tying concrete thoughts to abstract images is a great way to encourage imagination, and explaining what they see allows kids to link new vocabulary to their ideas. The chance for engaging conversation with an adult is a great way for kids to explore new ideas, open up about worries or plan a new adventure.

We work hard to make sure that our collection has what you want! At KDL, the Collection Development Department acts like a scout, navigating and researching the vast universe of publishing houses to ensure we have a diverse and well-balanced collection. The Collection Services Department is responsible for cataloging and tagging materials to help patrons find exactly what they are looking for and maybe even more.

According to Sheri Glon, Data Coordinator for KDL, materials have an average shelf life of eight years and will visit multiple branches before the end of their library life. I can only imagine the interesting stories that a library book could share about all the homes it has visited!

After the book has had a good shelf life and it's time to replace it with a fresh new copy, the book will be weeded out and reused, re-purposed or recycled. We believe that exercising intentionality throughout this process ensures the sustainability of our work and demonstrates good stewardship of our patrons' dollars. We also know that putting books in people's hands, no matter how, has an enormous impact on our communities by expanding our understanding of the world and helping us find our place in history. This is why we do what we do, and why we strive to do it sustainably.
