Kent District Library provides millions of resources, opportunities for Kent County residents

Despite unprecedented challenges in the last three years due to COVID-19 and a national surge in book bans, Kent District Library has continued to provide residents of all ages with access to millions of resources, directly supporting community development, entrepreneurship, early literacy and more.

KDL serves residents in 27 municipalities through 20 branches, a bookmobile, an Express Library, its main service center, 5,000-plus annual in-person programs and a host of patron-focused services, from inbranch printer/Wi-Fi access and loanable mobile hot spots to early literacy initiatives and an extensive collection of talking books and Braille resources.

Since 2014, KDL has seen utilization of its services grow in all areas, from circulation

and branch visits to card holders and event attendance. In 2022, library patrons saved an average of \$1,348 by using KDL's resources, though its value goes far beyond monetary comparisons.

"The library is so much more than a building," said KDL Executive Director Lance Werner. "We are a place for people to gather and connect, a gateway to ideas and critical thinking, and an inclusive space where all are welcomes and valued.

"We're proud of the millions of resources, programs and services we are able to provide residents of Kent County. As that critical 'third place,' we are honored to give Kent County residents millions of opportunities to learn, grow and come together."

Kent County to Activate Operation Green Light in November to Honor

During the week of November 6-12, area businesses and residents are being asked to replace outdoor lights with green bulbs to help support military veterans and to raise awareness about the resources available to them through the Kent County Veterans Services. Now in its second year, Operation Green Light is a national initiative of the National Association of Counties and the National Association

of County Veteran's Service Officers.

Kent County Veterans Services connects veterans and their families to earned benefits. These benefits may include emergency funds for unforeseen circumstances like rental assistance, utility payments, food grants, disability, spousal or dependent benefits, burial assistance, and more. Operation Green Light sheds light on these programs to aid veterans and their families in finding the programs that best fit their needs.

"We are excited to continue our success from the previous year when numerous businesses and residents actively participated," said Martha Burkett, Director of Kent County Veterans Services. "In this year's initiative, our aim extends beyond illuminating urban landmarks; we extend a challenge to individuals across every corner of the county to participate."


CORRECTION for article on new pastor at Bostwick Lake Congregational Church

Development Rights program, which compensates owners of agricultural property for their acceptance of a permanent deed restriction limiting its future development for non-agricultural purposes. The acquisition was made possible through federal funds, donations from Grattan Township, and the Sieracki family.

"We are very happy the Sieracki family decided to be a part of the Purchase of Development Rights program," said Matt Channing, agricultural preservation specialist at Kent County. "Preserving farmland within Kent County ensures land protection and local food security for generations."

The farm has been owned and operated by the Sieracki family for 22 years. Growing corn, soybeans, wheat, and hay on the property, Scott Sieracki decided to purchase the land after he and his wife moved to Michigan from Texas. Sieracki grew up helping on his grandfather's dairy farm, which influenced his purchase of the property from the Downs family who previously owned the farm for 80 years.

"We heard the Purchase of Development Rights program was successful in Kent County and it just made sense to my wife and I to preserve our land for years to come," said Scott Sieracki. "My grandfather, who has since passed, was also very much in favor of this opportunity to protect and preserve farmland so the 67 acres will continue to give farmers access to agricultural ground."

Since the Purchase of Development Rights program was authorized in 2002, the program has preserved approximately 2,800 acres and 29 properties. Farmland in Grattan Township accounts for 800 acres, about a quarter of all preserved farmland in Kent county.

The Agricultural Preservation Board selected the Sieracki farm because of its abundance of prime and unique soils, allowing for a broad diversity of agricultural production and its proximity to other protected parcels. The Purchase of Development Rights program uses a combination of state or federal grant funding, private donations and landowner contributions to purchase the development rights to farmland, creating a permanent agricultural conservation easement.

In the last nine years, total circulation of KDL's 700,000 physical items has increased by 20%. Its digital collection has doubled to include more than 15.6 million items and posted a circulation increase of 300%. This collection is not limited to books, music and movies; it features a wide range of educational materials including video courses, language lessons, online databases, research and at-home learning materials, Wi-Fi hotspots and a Talking Book & Braille Center.


These resources - and more - support early literacy and education and improve accessibility for residents. At-home learning materials support children learning how to read in a non-traditional classroom setting. WiFi hot spots allow individuals who do not have access to internet at home to connect to online resources, which was particularly critical during the pandemic. Braille resources give individuals with vision impairments a chance to experience the joy of reading.


The library also serves as a hub for thousands of programs, community gatherings and more each year. Program attendance at the library's 20 branches has increased by 62% since 2014. In 2022, more than 5,000 in-person programs were hosted by the library, ranging from weekly storytimes and teen movie nights to mental health seminars and lab experiments for students.

These programs help build community and connection across the more than 440,000 residents who live in KDL's service area. Whether it's parents with young children building camaraderie during an afternoon Babytime, students forming friendships during Teen Zone or young professionals connecting over shared interests, the library provides a safe space for people of all ages, demographics and backgrounds to come together to learn and connect.




