A record number of people attended our programs in 2023, highlighting the value of free entertainment and education. # 2023 at a Glance

## JANUARY

- **Let It Snow returned.** Over 3,700 participants read books from various reading categories and over 2,700 completed the program and earned a free mug.
- **KDL celebrated a record-breaking one million digital book checkouts in 2022.** This milestone illustrated the continued growth in and importance of KDL lending digital ebooks and audiobooks.

## FEBRUARY

- **Winners of the 11th annual Write Michigan Short Story Contest were announced.** Over 1,200 writers from across the state entered the contest.
- **KDL began accepting entries for the annual Write Michigan Teen Poetry Contest,** open to teens in grades 6-12 living in Kent County. It is a great opportunity for teens to share their writing and win a cool prize.

## MARCH

- **The Grand Rapids Chamber partnered with Kent District Library to support minority business growth.** The partnership supports connection to resources and expansion of collaborative workspaces.

## APRIL

- **KDL celebrated new play spaces with the “Find Your Knook Challenge.”** Families were invited to submit pictures of their children in one of the new WonderKnook playspaces for a chance to win a prize. The interactive WonderKnook playspaces contain unique materials, toys and activities intentionally designed to help young children get ready to read and learn.

## MAY

- **Grattan Twp. announced the new Express Library to bring KDL services closer to home for residents.** With the Express Library, patrons can check out and return items at their convenience.
- **The KDL Lab Expo took place at the Grandville Branch.** KDL Lab showcased a variety of STEAM experiences and partnered with local STEAM experts to provide hours of challenges and pure STEAM fun.
- **Community Engagement Manager Sara Proaño received a prestigious “Mover and Shaker” Award from *Library Journal*.**
- **The Talking Book and Braille Center celebrated its 50th anniversary and launched new technology.** TBBC now offers Braille eReaders to patrons.

## JUNE

- **Patrons of all ages embarked on a Summer Wonder journey of reading, learning and exploring through the great outdoors!** KDL teamed up with Kent County Parks to offer a spectacular summer of outdoor discovery, scavenger hunts, reading, STEAM activities and lots of fun for everyone.
- **KDL Executive Director Lance Werner was named the 2023 winner of ALA’s Ernest A. DiMattia Award for Innovation and Service to Community and Profession.** The award recognizes a librarian who demonstrates leadership in anticipating emerging trends in services, products and technologies that will enhance the library’s position in its community.
- **By popular demand, KDL expanded its CORE Collection to include picture books.** The Picture Book CORE Collection, available at all KDL branches, consists of 100 of the top circulating, perennially popular titles KDL has to offer. No holds are allowed, so you are practically guaranteed to find a good read.
- **KDL partnered with Feeding America of West Michigan to provide summer meals at 15 KDL branches and the Bookmobile.** Lunches for students ages 2-18 (or up to age 26 for people with disabilities) were available Monday through Friday at various times for no cost.

## JULY

- **The Kelloggsville Branch, located in Kelloggsville High School, turned five!** The branch celebrated with a Birthday Bash that included snacks, balloon animals, crafts, games, library and Bookmobile tours, and even a foam party!
- **As part of Summer Wonder, KDL teamed up with Kent County Parks to present “Find Curi!”** Families went on an outdoor scavenger hunt through local parks to find Curi, KDL’s Summer Wonder mascot.
- **StoryWalks were available at three local parks.** StoryWalk® encourages kids (and adults!) to enjoy reading and the outdoors at the same time. Walk along, read along... just follow the signs!

## AUGUST

- **Summer Wonder success!** Over 20,000 people participated, with over 18,000 completing the challenge.
- **Live phone interpreting services are now offered in more than 200 languages, ensuring greater access to KDL collections, programs and services.** Through this new over-the-phone service, patrons who speak languages other than English are now able to connect with KDL staff members.

## SEPTEMBER

- **The 12th annual Write Michigan Short Story Contest began accepting entries.** This statewide contest gives Michigan writers of all ages the chance to get published and win cash prizes.
- **KDL Vibes Fest was held at the Cascade Twp. Branch.** The music festival featured West Michigan artists from the KDL Vibes Collection.
- **Christine Beachler and Early Bird Books were awarded with the 2023 Literacy Champion Awards.** Beachler, a Media Center Specialist at Lowell Area Schools, received the individual award, and Early Bird Books received the organization award.
- **A programming series on mental wellness was offered in partnership with Wedgwood Christian Services and other mental health providers.**

## OCTOBER

- **Kent District Library and World Affairs Council of Western Michigan presented Voices of Indigenous Peoples for Community and Healing,** a free program series for adults. The series shed light on challenges facing indigenous groups and the work done to maintain and advocate for their cultural and political identity.
- **A revamped 1,000 Books Before Kindergarten program was launched** to help children fall in love with reading and prepare them for school. The updated program introduces an online tracking option, includes a book with early literacy activities and features Michigan woodland animals.

## NOVEMBER

- **Voters overwhelmingly approved KDL’s millage renewal with a 76.9% acceptance rate.** Voters approved the new, lower rate of 1.1 mills, which reflects a reduction of 10.9% off KDL’s previous millage rate of 1.2355 mills.
- **Kent District Library won the 2023 Jerry Kline Community Impact Prize.** KDL plans to reinvest \$250,000 in prize money into the community in two different ways – by supporting library expansion projects and establishing a scholarship fund.
- **The 12th annual Write Michigan Short Story Contest closed with over 1,150 entries.**

## DECEMBER

- **The Let It Snow Reading Club returned.** Adults and teens (ages 11+) who read or listen to six books from the Let It Snow reading categories between December 1 and February 29 earn a collectible Let It Snow mug.
- **On the Same Page, a community reading initiative, was announced.** The program brings people together around one book, *Tom Lake* by Ann Patchett, and will end with a celebratory “Meet the Author” event.



At the foundation of Maslow's pyramid lies the **physiological needs** essential for survival. KDL, much like a wellspring of knowledge, addresses this fundamental tier by providing a haven for learning and exploration in addition to providing essential needs for individuals.



**Gather 2 Grow** summer meal program – We partnered with Feeding America to serve over 20,000 meals to children in 2023.




**Shelter** – The library is a haven for people who are unhoused or experiencing power outages or extreme temperatures.

**Hygiene lockers** – Every KDL branch has a hygiene locker stocked with items like tampons, deodorant, oral hygiene products and more. People can take what they need.




Our **comprehensive collection** of resources, from books and digital media to expertly curated programs, serves as the lifeblood that nourishes the minds of our patrons.




Moving upward, we delve into the **safety and security needs** crucial for personal well-being. The library is not merely a repository of information; it is a sanctuary for our community. With a commitment to fostering an inclusive and welcoming environment, we strive to ensure that everyone feels secure in their pursuit of knowledge, free from judgment or discrimination in addition to seeking socio-economic advancement.

**Economic stability initiatives** – KDL teams up with community partners to create initiatives and programming for the head of household to break the cycle of poverty. To promote financial stabilization, KDL has focused on five pillars: entrepreneurship, career exploration, adult education, job attainment and professional development.



**WonderNook Playspaces** – Available at all 20 branches, these interactive playspaces contain unique materials, toys and activities intentionally designed to help young children get ready to read and learn.



As we ascend the pyramid, we encounter the **social needs** that bind us together. KDL serves as a social nexus – a space where connections are forged and ideas are exchanged. Our innovative programs and collaborative initiatives foster a sense of belonging, reinforcing the library as a communal anchor that transcends socio-economic and cultural boundaries.

**World Affairs Council of Western Michigan Partnership** – KDL partners with WACWM each year to present a programming series to help attendees engage thoughtfully with the world. The 2023 series focused on voices of indigenous people.

**Concerts for the Community** – This program provides families who would otherwise not have access, due to financial barriers, an opportunity to enjoy and be inspired by the Fifth Third Bank Summer Concerts at Frederik Meijer Gardens & Sculpture Park.

**Over-the-Phone Interpretation (OPI) service** – OPI is available in over 250 languages.



**Storytimes** – These programs are designed to promote early literacy skills and help young children fall in love with books and reading. Storytimes are available in multiple languages, including American Sign Language.



**Grattan Express Library** – The Grattan Township Express Library is a self-serve library collection that offers books, movies and games for checkout.



The **esteem needs**, which Maslow places near the pinnacle, underscore the importance of achievement, recognition and confidence. We empower individuals to realize their potential and celebrate their accomplishments.


**Summer Wonder, 1,000 Books Before Kindergarten and Let It Snow** – These reading programs help people of all ages discover a love of books, learning and reading.



**Write Michigan Short Story Contest and Teen Poetry Contest** – Library contests encourage people to get creative, show off their talents and be celebrated.



**KDL Vibes** – Provides a platform to support local artists and provides exposure to listeners in the community.



Finally, at the apex of Maslow's pyramid, we find **self-actualization** – the fulfillment of one's highest potential. KDL, as a beacon of enlightenment, strives to be the catalyst that propels individuals towards self-discovery and the realization of their aspirations.



**KDL Scholarship** – We are offering a new scholarship program for individuals who are enrolling in college or vocational training programs.

**Literacy Champion Award** – The annual award goes to one individual and one organization who does or has done something exceptional to promote literacy.

**Volunteerism** – In 2023, adults and teens donated over 6,000 hours of volunteer time to make KDL even more impactful and engaging.



When KDL partners with community organizations, we enhance outreach, foster collaboration, strengthen community bonds and have a better understanding of local needs. One of our favorite partners is Treetops Collective, a cross-cultural organization that connects with and invests in New American (refugee) women leaders, together transforming our communities into places of belonging.

## Treetops Collective

- **Language Learning** – Though KDL was already providing Mango Languages, a language-learning tool, it didn't work well for refugees in our community because it was word-based, and some of these people could not read or write. Treetops Collective requested that we offer Rosetta Stone, which is image-based and could be utilized by Treetops Collective members. We are thrilled to now offer this service.
- **Mentorship Program** – KDL staff members are encouraged to be a mentor in the community for one hour a week on work time. Many people mentor through Affinity Mentoring, but some KDL staff members mentor a refugee through Treetops Collective.
- **Event partnerships** – Training and outreach events put on by Treetops Collective with KDL support provide opportunities to sign up for library cards, introduce people to what the library has to offer, share stories, play games and join forces for a combined goal. Treetops Collective also participates in the Concerts for the Community program that introduces refugees to world-class cultural events at Frederik Meijer Gardens & Sculpture Park.
- **Little Free Library** – KDL set up and stocks a Little Free Library at Treetops Collective, ensuring that their members always have books to read.



"As an organization that is focused on creating a more welcoming community and providing connections and opportunities to our newcomer community of refugees and immigrants, our partnership with KDL has been a gift to our work. I always joke with my husband that the second I step into a local branch, I feel so excited to pay taxes!"

The library is truly a community space where everyone is treated as equals and as (KDL Community Engagement Manager) Sara Proaño so beautifully reminds us at our summer picnic each year, 'The staff works for you!' From being responsive to our request about language learning and accessibility in their acquisition of Rosetta Stone, to bringing the Bookmobile and activities to our annual summer picnic, to ensuring our local refugee community has library cards, to co-hosting our 'Say No to the Single Story' Book Club reminding our community that each perspective and lived experience is unique and valuable and that there is SO much to learn from each other – KDL truly spreads welcome alongside Treetops!"

# Strategic Plan

In 2023, we wrapped up a three-year strategic plan that was based on a cascading framework that maintained a clear focus on top-line organizational goals and strategies with the efforts of all teams aligned. The overarching goals were:

- Align all library services, staffing makeup and partnerships to be reflective and inclusive of the diverse communities we serve.
- Increase the value delivered to the community by focusing on demonstrated needs.
- Evaluate and streamline operational, environmental and fundraising processes to ensure a sustainable library.

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Now we've launched a new three-year plan that outlines our purpose, vision, business goals, annual operational initiatives and core values. It serves as a lens to assess all ideas and determine priorities.

These strategic goals will guide us to live out our core values: to be an inclusive, authentic, positive, courageous and helpful presence in each community we serve. Successfully living out our core values ultimately helps us to achieve our purpose – to further all people.

Annual reports typically look back at the previous year, but here's a glimpse at the future, with our three pillars of focus and 2024 initiatives.

## Strengthening Community

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**We will celebrate distinctive communities by proactively prioritizing meaningful partnerships and patron relationships, finding commonalities with our neighbors, and intentionally connecting resources.**

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**INITIATIVE #1:** Evaluate community partnerships by accessing data to establish reciprocity and shared goals, develop a partnership intake process and prioritize relationships and partnerships at the branch and system levels to reveal where there may be gaps or overlaps. Create a “Who Is My Community” map for each branch so key partnerships are highlighted and communicated.



**INITIATIVE #2:** Assess each in-branch experience to optimize engagement opportunities and to encourage gathering as well as one-on-one engagement between patrons, and between staff and patrons. Find ways to make the branch a destination.

## Technology

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We will proactively explore evolutions in the ever-changing technological landscape to optimize resources, enhance services and embrace education on adoption.



**INITIATIVE #3:** Get acquainted with the esports and gaming community to better understand where the library is best positioned to take steps toward providing access as well as creating opportunity regarding gaming educational curriculum, programming, and spaces to accommodate. Develop a testing lab at the KDL Service Center and determine where the first esports branch lab will be.

**INITIATIVE #4:** Invest in technologies to further streamline operational processes to reallocate staff time to better serve and connect with patrons. Conduct a time study and create a detailed time reallocation plan to ensure systemwide priorities remain aligned.

## Core Programming

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Our programming will be strategically focused on defining and providing exciting, valuable core programs that give people access to experience and invite further exploration of KDL's services and spaces.

**INITIATIVE #5:** Hold a galvanizing community read program (*On the Same Page*) to engage current patrons and, more importantly, attract new people in our service area to KDL with all the library has to offer. In addition, focus on events that are guaranteed to bring our community together and find commonalities.

**INITIATIVE #6:** Revamp the Mission: Read program or create a replacement school-aged program to address third grade reading deficits. Focus on creating a timely, achievable and sustainable program to go in effect fall 2024. Leverage and strengthen school partnerships and market to students who are especially vulnerable.




## Return on Investment

The Talking Book & Braille Center (TBBC) is a national program that provides accessible reading material to anyone who cannot read standard print because of a visual or physical impairment. Kent District Library's TBBC serves Kent, Ionia and Montcalm counties under the direction of the Bureau of Services for Blind Persons Braille & Talking Book Library. In addition to providing Braille and audio materials (including audiobooks, described movies and audio magazines) to TBBC patrons, KDL has a suite of adaptive technology that includes a CCTV, a Braille embosser, a text-to-speech scanner and an accessible computer equipped with a large print keyboard, screen reading and Braille translation software packages.




Circulation by Oakfield Township Residents





Circulation by Vergennes Township Residents


