MAXIMIZE LOVE MANAGE STRESS




Looking for more activities that promote love within families? Try playing a game outside together or dancing to a new song.


SING AND POINT

What's New,

What's New, Daniel? by Micha Archer offers an invitation to look around and notice the new life springing up all around. Daniel can't find the words to his grandpa's question "What's new?" until he explores the park and discovers that not only is the world being made new, but that he is growing and changing too. From a lost tooth to learning how to whistle, Daniel discovers that he has much to talk about with his grandpa.

As you read the story, take time to enjoy the illustrations. Each spread vividly shows Daniel's discoveries. Talk about how Daniel is imagining the world around him talking to him as he notices each new thing. Next time you go for a walk with the child in your life, imagine what a squirrel

could be saying to you or where a cardinal is going. Point out the buds on trees or the colors of the flowers. Talk about what's new in your life too, and challenge yourselves to ask someone else "What's new?" and really listen.

For more books about connecting with the natural world, try **Beneath** by Cori Doerrfeld, **A New Green Day** by Antoinette Portis and <u>At the Park</u> by Anna Süssbauer.



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
