



SING AND POINT















GROUP AND COMPARE




Practicing counting and comparison skills with the child in your life can be done with many different books, not just ones specifically focused on those skills. For a fun October read, try *Go Away, Big Green Monster!* by Ed Emberley. This storytime staple is great read aloud and offers a chance to practice noticing.

The die-cut construction of the book offers an easy way to point out different shapes like "two big yellow eyes." Try counting the monster's teeth and finding delight in telling each one to go away. Point out colors as you go along, such as the fact that the monster's nose is the same color as their ears.

For more favorite storytime books that help children practice counting and comparing, try *Mister Kitty is Lost!* by Greg Pizzoli, *Ten in a Hurry* by Lo Cole and *Freight Train* by Donald Crews.






"Mistakes are fun, aren't they?"







Full of great sounds to make together and bright, bold illustrations to enjoy, this story reminds readers young and old that life is full of unexpected obstacles but also rich
