




This gentle tale reminds readers that "it's not the things we own but the love we share that truly matters."





AND DISCUSS STORIES



Sally's Snow Day by Andrew Larsen and Dawn Lo offers a comforting, cozy read for cold days. Join Sally and her owner for a playful look at winter. Before reading the story, open up the book to the endpapers, the decorative design on the inside covers of the book, to find the snowflakes and snowballs featured in the story. Talking about book design with young children can help develop visual thinking skills and art appreciation.

As you read, talk together about what you see in the illustrations. When Sally needs her boots and coat, can you find them on the page? What activities does Sally do that you also do in winter?
