# **MAXIMIZE LOVE MANAGE STRESS**




#### Take a Breath, Big Red

*Monster!* by Ed Emberley is a heartwarming and empowering picture book that gently guides young readers through big feelings with love and understanding. This vibrant, monster-filled tale taps into the powerful message of "maximize love, manage stress," reminding children that even the biggest, loudest emotions are okay and manageable with care, connection and a deep breath.

As the Big Red Monster feels overwhelmed by frustration and fury, young readers are invited to pause, reflect and breathe right alongside him. Through playful storytelling and expressive illustrations, this book creates a safe space where feelings are acknowledged and met with compassion. It also serves as a great read-aloud for helping kids explore their emotions and illustrates that every feeling matters and that love, calm and connection are always close by.


After reading *Take a Breath, Big Red Monster!*, spend some time with the child in your life creating a "Feelings Monster" using paper and crayons, giving it a color and name based on how they feel.

# **SING AND POINT**




Is your little one starting to grasp the concept of letters and loves a silly story? Then *It Started with a P* by Brittany Pomales and Andrew Joyner is the perfect book for you!

When the King wakes up with a premonition that something starting with the letter "P" will ruin his birthday, there's just one problem—he can't remember what that mysterious "P" thing is.

He decides to rid his entire kingdom of anything that starts with the letter P. Pepperoni pizza? Gone! Piñatas? Out! Pigeons, presents and even people are sent away, all in an effort to save his special day. But was the King right to worry... or just hilariously overreacting?

This playful story about overthinking is also a great opportunity to explore early literacy skills. Focusing on a single letter encourages children to recognize the starting sounds of words and connect them to everyday objects around them. What "P" words can you and the child in your life spot in your home or neighborhood?


But the bike's story isn't finished yet. Enjoy all the comparisons throughout the book and see how even an old bike can have a new life.

Join the group of kids in *This Is Our* <u>*City*</u> by Lauren Conrad and enjoy the welcoming, inventive city they've built. With cut-paper collage illustrations and jaunty rhyming text, this is a lovely invitation to imagine new ways of seeing the world around us.

The book declares "This is our city... And this is us, welcoming you." From beginning to end, this story showcases delightfully imaginative friendships and landscapes. What ideas for new worlds could you and the child in your life create in a backyard or a park?

Bright and colorful illustrations provide plenty of visual interest while interactive sounds create a fun read-aloud experience. Point out to the toddler or preschooler in your life how the action and sound words in the story are in different fonts, sizes and colors than the main text. Noticing how a book is created helps develop awareness of intentional design.
