

MAXIMIZE LOVE MANAGE STRESS




Everywhere You Are by Victoria Monét and Alea Marley is a tender celebration of love that follows a child through the many places and moments where care can be felt. With lyrical text and vibrant illustrations, the book gently reassures children that love is constant.

Monét's heartfelt words paired with Marley's expressive artwork create a timeless story that reminds readers love can be present everywhere you are. Try inviting the child in your life to draw and share a picture of a place where they feel loved and safe after reading the story. This helps them connect the story's theme of love being present everywhere to their own lives.

SING AND POINT



Going back to school can be both exciting and stressful. Whether your child is starting preschool for the very first time or an older sibling is heading back to class, it's natural for questions and worries to come up. Books can be a comforting way to ease those anxieties and open up conversations during the transition. One wonderful story to share is **! Come From Another Galaxy** by James Kwan.


In this imaginative tale, adventurous astronaut James faces his first day of school on a faraway planet. At first, he feels out of place: He doesn't speak the language, doesn't know the games (like slimeball!) and struggles to fit in. But everything changes on show-and-tell day when he discovers that sharing a piece of himself helps bridge the gap. It's a heartwarming reminder that being different is not only okay but can also bring connection.

Back-to-school season often stirs up uncertainty and big feelings. Reading together can give children a sense of familiarity and reassurance, while also opening the door to meaningful conversations. By sharing stories like this one, you can help the child in your life imagine what school might be like and create a positive, encouraging narrative around the new year ahead.


MOVEMENT AND PLAY



Yuly invites the reader into Sloth's climb to find the tasty leaves at the top of the tree with the refrain "Go, Sloth, go!," making this ripe for read-aloud potential. As you read the story with the child in your life, talk about how the colors of the illustrations change in the story. Yuly's minimal color palette of greens and blues changes to oranges

and purples, showing that Sloth's quest has taken the whole day as the sun sets and the book ends. With older children, talk about the opposites slow and fast and how the pacing of
